Historic Service at Methodist Central Hall Welcomes New London District Chair, Revd Faith Nyota

On Sunday 7 September, Methodist Central Hall Westminster (MCHW) was, despite the London Underground strike, filled with worshippers, church leaders and civic guests for a landmark service marking the start of the new Methodist year. The joint service, held with the London District, formally welcomed Revd Faith Nyota as the new Chair of District. This coincided with the visit of the President and Vice-President of Methodist Conference to the Westminster Circuit, and drew the presence of the General Secretary, Revd Dr Jonathan Hustler, and Assistant Secretary, Revd Micky Youngson, who presided over communion.

Revd Faith Nyota takes up leadership of the London District, alongside Revd Dr Jonathan Dean, at a time of significant change and opportunity for the Methodist Church in the capital. The District will be launching its new 5-year Mission Plan on 20th September; centering on its vision to become a church seeking growth, reaching out to all and embracing God's world.
